### External review: Dean's questions

- 1. What is the evidence that a 4 credit class is necessary (versus a 3 credit class)?
- 2. What are other models we should consider where the writing/composition requirement is shared by other units in CLA and across the campus?
- 3. What should be the expectation for faculty instruction in these courses? That is, should all English faculty be expected to teach at least one section of composition per year?

# Changes to English 108

### Three key changes to English 108

- Decoupling English 108 from service learning & community engagement: we will still offer sections with the latter, just not all of them
- 2. More faculty teaching the course regularly
- 3. More sections, balanced between fall and spring

### What's not changing about English 108

- 1. "Accelerated" approach: doing the work of 106 in two or three days without conferencing vs. four with conferencing — so more independent, agile learners
- 2. Graduate students will still teach it
- 3. Outcomes, curriculum

### Infrastructure work for English 108

- 1. Harmonizing outcomes with English 106
- 2. Modifying processes, support, materials built with graduate student professional development in mind
- 3. Rebuilding materials for advisors, directed self placement guides for students

### Faculty in English 108

- Part of proactive approach regarding pressure on ICaP from Dean Reingold (documented in self-study)
- Five-day, four-credit nature of English 106 doesn't work for faculty
- Tentatively five sections for Fall 2017 and Spring 2017 (ten for year = 190± students = 4% of FYW enrollment)
